Foreword

FIXING THE BROKEN COUNCIL: GLOUCESTER DESERVES BETTER

After seventeen long years of Conservative rule at Gloucester City Council, it is quite clear that it's time for a change. Gloucester deserves better.

The Conservatives presided over the scandal of the collapse of Marketing Gloucester Limited, leaving its creditors with debts of £1 million. There certainly is a need to hold an independent inquiry into what went wrong. A Lib Dem council will commission such an inquiry.

The Amey waste contract has been poor value at over £5 million a year and delivered a failing service. It has been described as the 'worst contract ever' by the current Conservative leader of the council.

We will work closely with Ubico (a company the council will part own) who take over the waste and environmental services contract from April 2022, to improve services such as street cleaning and litter bin emptying.

Delivering on the city's regeneration plans requires that the council works closely with partners to achieve completion. Often this may require capital investment from the public sector.



That is why it is so disappointing that the Conservatives failed to get a penny from the Government's Future High Street Fund. Swindon got £25 million. We plan to review the council's bidding process so that it is more robust in the future. Gloucester must be a winner.

There is a desperate need for more affordable homes to be built in Gloucester. The performance under the Conservatives is just not good enough. That is why we shall form a council owned housing company to build new homes.

The environment is so important and more must be done to tackle air pollution and carbon emissions. We will ensure that the council is a zero-carbon local authority by 2030. We will plant many more trees, encourage cycling and walking and reduce air pollution throughout Gloucester.

Under the Tories the council has been described as the 'vanishing council'. It is selling its HQ and now renting cramped accommodation on the fifth floor at Shire Hall.

The Liberal Democrats will rebuild our public services, making sure projects whether small or large can be delivered swiftly and effectively, because Gloucester deserves better.

Together, we can change the direction of the council, and make Gloucester an even better place to live and work, for us and for the next generation.
